Re: Over-Population of Deer in the City of West Allis

Dear Members of Common Council:

Attached is a *Petition to the City of West Allis for Deer Control on Private Properties* which addresses the increased deer population in our area, the subsequent damage being caused to our landscaping, and the potential health hazard. We live in the city proper, not in a rural area or farmland. The sighting of any deer in any area of the city should be an unusual or rare circumstance, not a regular happening or a normal, everyday occurrence. Additionally, we should not be seeing deer in large numbers, at any one sighting, in the proper of West Allis or on any of our properties.

**Complaints Received From Homeowners**

While seeking signatures and talking to homeowners in the area, they expressed their frustration and **anger with the** landscape damage done to their property and the fact that the **elected officials of the City of West Allis** are ignoring this growing problem and the resultant additional problems that will be forthcoming in the future if no action is undertaken now. Some of the comments I received are:

- \* *Too many deer in the area.*
- \* *They are eating all my flowers.*
- \* *They ate all of my hostias and many other plants.*
- \* *They ate everything off my evergreen tree.*
- \* *My yard is full of droppings and my dogs are rolling in it.*
- \* *Every morning, there are 6-12 deer on my property.*
- \* *I see 5-6 deer running through my yard on a regular basis.*
- \* *They rubbed the bark off my crabapple tree and another tree just planted by the City.*
- \* *I saw 10 deer running from around my neighbor's house and down the street at full speed. If I had been walking in the street I would have been concerned for my safety. (Seymour Place location.)*
- \* *I saw 6-12 deer just standing on the neighbor's front yard yesterday morning.*
- \* *The deer knocked over a small fence in the back yard.*
- \* *Six deer were casually walking down the middle of the street early this morning.*
- \* *I saw 33 deer casually cross National Avenue. I know, I counted them.*
- \* *I have called the City and the DNR complaining about the deer in my yard, but nothing was done.*
- \* *They are right next to the house, by the windows and/or patio door. They are no longer afraid of us [humans].*
- \* *There is a deer that looks like it is foaming at the mouth.*
- \* *I hit a deer on Cleveland Avenue – just by Hale.*
- \* *Deer are hit on National Avenue all the time.*
- \* *I am afraid to walk in the street when it gets dark.*
- \* *Coyotes killed a fawn. ) Coyotes are now on the increase because of the available food*
- \* *I see Coyotes in the Parkway all the time. ) source in the form of deer. This is going to pose an additional,*
- \* *A coyote attacked the neighbor's dog. ) future threat to residents and pets alike.*

While these are just a few of the comments I received, they were repeated over and over again.

**Our Particular Problems:**

- \* We have two 3' wide bushes which retain their leaves during the winter. The deer have eaten just the leaves off both bushes. We are hopeful that the bushes will recover, but new growth/recovery is slow.
- \* One-half a grocery bag was filled with deer droppings deposited in our yard over this past winter. Obviously, deer are urinating in the yard as well.
- \* A deer was standing at the edge of our patio, looking into the house. There was concern that it might actually run into the patio door and break the glass or cause other damage to the patio door.
- \* Hoofs have made a pathway and numerous holes in the grass which will have to be filled and reseeded.
- \* Hostas and other plants and flowers are eaten all year long.
- \* The side of our house is a pathway for deer crossing Seymour Place. They are coming from Cleveland Avenue and Waukesha Road.
- \* Deer carry ticks and I am concerned about the spread of Lyme Disease. I am constantly walking in the grass and working in my flowerbeds and I do not want to be bitten by a tick in my own yard.

The deer are not a new dilemma in this area. However, the number of deer has increased to the point where they are no longer considered to be beautiful or enjoyable. Now, other serious problems are occurring. We currently have coyotes in the vicinity as the deer have become an abundant source of food for them. Once the coyotes become a common sight, residents will start to feed them as well. As a consequence, the coyotes will no longer be fearful of us and they will start to attack not only adult humans, but small animals and small children. What is the City going to do when they receive a call that a small child has been killed and/or is carried away. How much of the taxpayers' money will be spent to defend lawsuits due to the City's negligence or refusal to address and resolve these current problems? Will it be more than the City would have to spend now to reduce the deer herd? **Just how much longer will the City ignore the current problems or refuse to take action!! What is the City going to do NOW to resolve the number of deer in the area BEFORE these numbers escalate beyond control?**

**West Allis Health Department (Ph: 302-8655)**

The following information regarding deer ticks and Lyme Disease was obtained during a telephone conversation with Dan at the West Allis Health Department.

- \* A few cases of Lyme Disease are reported each month to the Health Department. Follow-up is not done because Lyme Disease is not considered to be a communicable disease. But it is already happening.
- \* Deer spread ticks just by walking on your property and by shaking themselves. The ticks fall to the ground/grass and are spread to bushes and other plants as well. If you are in an area where deer are present, there are ticks and Lyme Disease will naturally follow.

To reiterate -- it is a proven fact that ticks stick close to home. It's been estimated that three-quarters of all Lyme cases were acquired through household activities -- gardening, playing or relaxing in the yard, for example, instead of taking a camping trip or hike far from home. Ticks love to hide in plants and shrubs, grasses, and woodpiles, all of which are common in many residential landscapes. They also will catch a ride on your pet dog or cat.

As the deer increase, so will Lyme Disease. **What is the City going to do NOW about this health problem. What will the City do NOW to prevent a future SERIOUS outbreak of Lyme Disease.**

**Deer Related Problems Provided By West Allis Police Department**

Using the very limited search parameters of 91 Street to 124 Street, from Morgan Avenue to Lincoln Avenue, and from 2008 to the present, I requested that the Police Department search their records for deer related calls/incidents. They have informed me that they have 355 pages of animal related complaints. However, these pages cannot be separated into a specific animal; i.e. deer. However, you can be sure that there are deer complaints within these 355 pages.

The Police Department was, however, able to provide a printout of 16 specific accident reports during this same time period. A one page summary of these accidents is attached. These accidents are hazardous, injurious, and costly to both the vehicles and the individuals involved.


**Summary**


We, the homeowners who have signed this petition, are fed up. We want to be able to sit, relax, walk, play games, and enjoy our yards to the fullest extent possible -- without having to continuously work to replace or repair costly landscaping or be concerned about disease. We pay enough taxes for this right! We want the elected officials of the City of West Allis to stop ignoring the situation, take immediate steps to remedy the issues at hand, and do it now before it escalates further, causing additional accidents and taxpayers' money, property damage, and disease. (Budget can no longer be the deciding factor or be used as an excuse. As the number of deer increase so will the problems intensify. As a result, the cost and the City budget will be dramatically increased as well.)

In particular, we want the City of West Allis to take immediate action to accomplish the following:

1. Pass a municipal law, with penalties, prohibiting residents from providing any food whatsoever or salt licks, to the deer; and
2. Work with the surrounding communities and the DNR to take immediate steps to eliminate the deer herd in our city.

**PETITION TO THE CITY OF WEST ALLIS

DEER CONTROL ON PRIVATE PROPERTIES**

During the past five years the deer herds in the outlying areas of the City of West Allis have increased significantly. Past sightings of deer were rare and then you usually saw only one at a time. That has drastically changed. Now, sightings are not of just one deer, but as many as five or six running across the street, through backyards, sunbathing under an evergreen tree in your yard, eating the flowers and other plants in your garden, eating leaves off an entire bush, walking onto your patio and/or looking into your house, and depositing their droppings throughout your entire property. Property damage is now the norm, rather than the unusual, and is costing us homeowners hundreds of dollars. In fact, the deer have become so tame that the sight of a human is no longer of any concern. Us humans are no longer feared, but are now considered to be a species <sup>providing</sup> providing food in the form of our landscaping.

The deer population in West Allis has gotten completely out of control and the City needs to do something immediately to thin their population. As stated above, landscaping is being damaged; bushes and flowers alike are being eaten; and the yards are full of droppings -- so many droppings that you do not want your children playing in your own back yard.

Therefore, we the undersigned property owners are asking that the City of West Allis take IMMEDIATE AND NECESSARY steps to control the deer population in the City of West Allis.

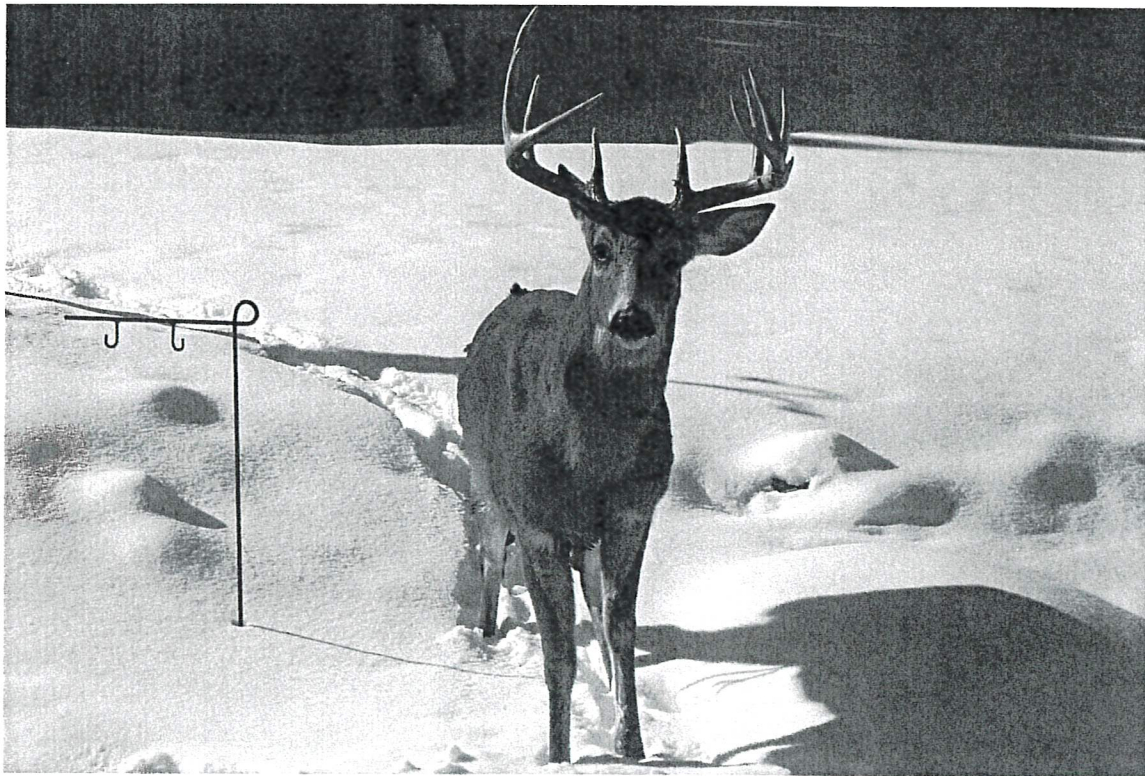

## **What is the History of Lyme Disease?**

### **Lyme Disease Made Its Debut in 1975**

Interestingly, the disease only became apparent in 1975 when mothers of a group of children who lived near each other in **Lyme, Connecticut**, made researchers aware that their children had all been diagnosed with rheumatoid arthritis. This unusual grouping of illness that appeared "rheumatoid" eventually led researchers to the identification of the bacterial cause of the children's condition, what was then called "Lyme disease" in 1982.

### **What is Lyme disease? What causes Lyme disease?**

Lyme disease is a bacterial illness caused by a bacterium called a "spirochete." In the United States, the actual name of the bacterium is Borrelia burgdorferi. In Europe, another bacterium, Borrelia afzelii, also causes Lyme disease. Certain ticks found on deer harbor the bacterium in their stomachs. Lyme disease is spread by these ticks when they bite the skin, which permits the bacterium to infect the body. Lyme disease is not contagious from an affected person to someone else. Lyme disease can cause abnormalities in the skin, joints, heart, and nervous system.

### **What is the history of Lyme disease?**

Interestingly, the disease only became apparent in 1975 when mothers of a group of children who lived near each other in Lyme, Connecticut, made researchers aware that their children had all been diagnosed with rheumatoid arthritis. This unusual grouping of illness that appeared "rheumatoid" eventually led researchers to the identification of the bacterial cause of the children's condition, what was then called "Lyme disease" in 1982.

Ticks are carriers of the Lyme bacterium in their stomachs. The ticks then are vectors that can transmit the bacterium to humans with a tick bite. The number of cases of the disease in an area depends on the number of ticks present and how often the ticks are infected with the bacteria. In certain areas of New York, where Lyme disease is common, over half of the ticks are infected. Lyme disease has been reported most often in the northeastern United States, but it has been reported in all 50 states, as well as China, Europe, Japan, Australia, and parts of the former Soviet Union. **In the United States, it is primarily contracted in the Northeast from the state of Maine to Maryland, in the Midwest in Minnesota and Wisconsin, and in the West in Oregon and Northern California.**

### **What are symptoms and signs of Lyme disease?**

Lyme disease affects different areas of the body in varying degrees as it progresses. The site where the tick bites the body is where the bacteria enter through the skin. As the bacteria spread in the skin away from the initial tick bite, the infection causes an expanding reddish rash that is often associated with "flu-like" symptoms. Later, it can produce abnormalities in the joints, heart, and nervous system.

Lyme disease is medically described in three phases as: (1) **early localized disease** with skin inflammation; (2) **early disseminated disease** with heart and nervous system involvement, including palsies and meningitis; and (3) **late disease** featuring motor and sensory nerve damage and brain inflammation as well as arthritis.

In the early phase of the illness, within days to weeks of the tick bite, the skin around the bite develops an expanding ring of unraised redness. There may be an outer ring of brighter redness and a central area of clearing, leading to a "bull's-eye" appearance. This classic initial rash is called "erythema migrans" (formerly called erythema chronicum migrans). Patients often can't recall the tick bite (the ticks can be as small as the periods in this paragraph). Also, they may not have the identifying rash to signal the doctor. More than one in four patients never get a rash. The redness of the skin is often accompanied by generalized fatigue, muscle and joint stiffness, swollen lymph nodes ("swollen glands"), and headache resembling symptoms of a virus infection.

The redness resolves, without treatment, in about a month. Weeks to months after the initial redness of the skin, the bacteria and their effects spread throughout the body. Subsequently, disease in the joints, heart, and nervous system can occur.

The later phases of Lyme disease can affect the heart, causing inflammation of the heart muscle. This can result in abnormal heart rhythms and heart failure. The nervous system can develop facial muscle paralysis (Bell's palsy), abnormal sensation due to disease of peripheral nerves (peripheral neuropathy), meningitis, and confusion. Arthritis, or inflammation in the joints, begins with swelling, stiffness, and pain. Usually, only one or a few joints become affected, most commonly the knees. The arthritis of Lyme disease can look like many other types of inflammatory arthritis and can become chronic.

Researchers have also found that anxiety and depression occur with an increased rate in people with Lyme disease. This is another important aspect of the evaluation and management of this condition.

In early Lyme disease, doctors can sometimes make a diagnosis simply by finding the classic red rash (described above), particularly in people who have recently been in regions in which Lyme disease is common. The doctor might review the patient's history and examine the patient in order to exclude diseases with similar findings in the joints, heart, and nervous system. Blood testing for antibodies to Lyme bacteria is generally not necessary or helpful in early stage disease, but it can help in diagnosis in later stages. (Antibodies are produced by the body to attack the bacteria and can be evidence of exposure to the bacteria. These antibodies can be detected using a laboratory method called an enzyme-linked immunosorbent assay [ELISA].) Antibodies, however, can be false indicators of disease, since they can remain for years after the disease is cured. Moreover, false-positive tests in patients with nonspecific findings (those that are not specifically suggestive of Lyme disease) can lead to confusion. Currently, the confirmatory test that is most reliable is the Western Blot assay antibody test. More accurate tests are being developed.

Generally, Lyme blood testing is helpful in a patient who has symptoms compatible with Lyme disease, who has a history of a tick bite at least a month prior, or who has unexplained disorders of the heart, joints, or nervous system that are characteristic of Lyme disease.

### **What is the treatment for Lyme disease?**

Most cases of Lyme disease are curable with antibiotics. This is so true that some authors of Lyme disease research have stated that the most common cause of lack of response of Lyme disease to antibiotics is a lack of Lyme disease to begin with! The type of antibiotic depends on the stage of the disease (early or late) and what areas of the body are affected. Early illness is usually treated with medicines taken by mouth, for example, doxycycline (Vibramycin), amoxicillin, or cefuroxime axetil. Therefore, if a person finds a typical bull's-eye skin rash (described above) developing in an area of a tick bite, they should seek medical attention as soon as possible. Generally, antibiotic treatment resolves the rash within one or two weeks with no long-term consequences. Later illness such as nervous-system disease might require intravenous drugs; examples are ceftriaxone (Rocephin) and penicillin G.

For the relief of symptoms, pain-relieving medicines might be added. Swollen joints can be reduced by the doctor removing fluid from them (arthrocentesis). An arthrocentesis is a procedure whereby fluid is removed from a joint using a needle and syringe under sterile conditions. It is usually performed in a doctor's office. Rarely, even with appropriate antibiotics, the arthritis continues. It has been suggested by researchers that sometimes joint inflammation can persist even after eradication of the Lyme bacteria. This has been explained as an ongoing autoimmune response causing inflammation of the joint that was initially stimulated by the original bacterial infection. The doctor also can use oral medications such as ibuprofen (Motrin, Nuprin) to reduce inflammation and improve function.

### **How can Lyme disease be prevented? Is there a vaccine?**

Because Lyme disease is transmitted by ticks attaching to the body, it is important to use tick-bite avoidance techniques when visiting known tick areas. Spraying insect repellent containing DEET onto exposed skin can help. Wearing long pants tucked into boots and long sleeves can protect the skin. Clothing, children, and pets should be examined for ticks. Ticks can be removed gently with tweezers and saved in a jar for later identification. Bathing the skin and scalp and washing clothing upon returning home might prevent the bite and transmission of the disease.

Vaccines were formerly on the market; however, as of Feb. 25, 2002, the manufacturer announced that the LYMErix<sup>TM</sup> Lyme disease vaccine will no longer be commercially available. Further studies of vaccines are needed. For now, ideal prevention focuses on the recommendations of the preceding paragraph.

### **Lyme Disease At A Glance**

- Lyme disease is a bacterial illness that is spread by tick bites.
- Lyme disease can affect the skin, joints, heart, and the nervous system.
- Lyme disease occurs in phases -- the early phase beginning at the site of the tick bite with an expanding ring of redness.
- Lyme disease is diagnosed based on the patient's clinical signs of illness and the detection of Lyme antibodies in the blood.
- Lyme disease is treated with antibiotics.
