Dear Mr. Stibal:

Dating back to 2006, The City of West Allis has worked in cooperation with the School District of West Allis-West Milwaukee in planning redevelopment of the Brownfield site that has been underutilized as a capped landfill for nearly 50 years. The redevelopment plans included the creation of a soccer facility to be annexed to the adjacent athletic fields that are located at the southeast corner of the West Allis Athletic Complex. Initially in July 2006, we jointly submitted an application for the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources Brownfields Green Space & Public Facilities Grant Program to that end.

We now have an opportunity to see this dream come to fruition for our community. After many years of trying, the West Allis-West Milwaukee School District has received a grant award from the United States Soccer Foundation Safe Places to Play and a matching private donation to create the soccer field and multi-use artificial surface.

The creation of this soccer field adjacent to our West Allis Athletic Complex site is an exciting project that will serve a wide range of constituents within our community. There has been a long standing need for these and additional facilities serving and supporting the West Allis-West Milwaukee School District and the entire range of youth through adult and senior recreational needs. This redevelopment project addresses community-wide needs while utilizing an unused Brownfield property. These needs have also been addressed in the City of West Allis Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan.

This addition to the athletic complex will provide a gathering place and will add quality recreational space for the entire community. The facilities will enhance the benefits experienced

from school district varsity sports, intramural sports, youth activities, community leagues, and city-wide leisure activities. The complex will also serve as a focal point for family-oriented recreational activities, adding to the community's limited and valuable open space system. This synthetic turf soccer field at the West Allis Athletic Complex will greatly expand not only soccer field access and usage but create a multi-use purpose as well. To date, several partnerships activities have occurred to support this project.

- The School District partnered with the City of West Allis and was awarded a Brownfield Grant from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources to conduct a floodplain study within the West Allis Hale Athletic Complex grounds to enable the future development of a soccer field stadium.
- The West Allis Civic Improvement Foundation Dinner Dances identified that the funds raised be directed towards the soccer facility.

Our next step in this process to secure the grant and additional donation is to move forward with a transfer of ownership which is part of the funding requirement. Therefore, the School District of West Allis-West Milwaukee is formally requesting to purchase the Brownfield property located at South 113 & Lincoln Avenue West Allis, Wisconsin, 53227, for \$1.00 (one dollar and no cents). We are working with Stephen Bartoszewski from Ayres and Associates Engineering Firm, the same firm the City of West Allis has used for our joint grant and Department of Natural Resources work.

We are in receipt of your letter dated February 20, 2009 requesting a variance for GRN-018, West Allis Athletic Fields. You requested this variance due to the multiple changes that have happened during the planning and coordination phase of your redevelopment process.

With this in mind, we are approving and extension of this grant until December 1, 2009. This request is being approved under s. NR 173.21(1), Wis. Adm. Code. The grant period for GRN-018 is December 20, 2006 until December 1, 2009. This should permit the City of West Allis to complete their grant activities during the upcoming 2009 construction season.

The City's deadline for submitting a final reimbursement request must be completed within six (6) months after the end of this extended grant period. All requirements listed in the grant agreement must be met before final reimbursement can be made. A final report and any documentation (reports, etc) must also be submitted at the same time as the final reimbursement request. No other variance request will be accepted.
