children. We are very sorry this happened to the officer but to deem her a dangerous dog seems

yard. The police took Roxie to Madacc for quarantine for 10 days where they evaluated her to be
healthy for her age and fit to go home. The officer told my daughter that he went into the house
unannounced and that the Roxie and my daughter would not get into trouble for this because that what
