RE: Naming the Henderson Park and Orchard Hills Neighborhoods

Dear Common Council Members:

This letter is a request to identify and name two neighborhoods. I suggest that the area of the City between 76th and 84th Streets on the east and west, Greenfield Avenue on the north, and National Avenue on the south be named the Henderson Park Neighborhood. This area contains about 75 homes that are about 100 years old. It was the site of the Henderson farm, and the family played a part in the City's early history. Many of the homes were built as summer homes for people wanting to get out of the city and into the countryside. The name Henderson Park was a name of one of the area's subdivisions as it developed.

The second neighborhood did not require any research to name it. It has been Orchard Hills for as long as many residents remember. It was the site of the Cooper orchard and farm and was developed in the late 50's and early 60's. It includes the area between the Root River Parkway on the east, 124th Street on the west, National Avenue on the north, and Morgan Avenue on the south. The Cooper Family purchased the land in 1839, and the homestead is still occupied by a descendent of the early settlers. This home was built in 1844 and is the oldest structure still in existence in our City.

The Historical Commission has reviewed these proposed neighborhoods and concurs with the names.

I look for your approval in naming these areas of the City as the Henderson Park Neighborhood and the Orchard Hills Neighborhood.
