2024 Accomplishments



Billboard Campaign

Prevention & Early Intervention

- 6 billboards installed in areas with high overdose rates
- Messaging focused on raising awareness about opioid overdose prevention
- 8.5 million people reached







Hanging Banner Campaign

Prevention & Early Intervention

- Strategically installed hanging banners in liquor stores, gas stations, and convenience stores in areas with high overdose rates
- Messaging focused on raising awareness about opioid overdose prevention
- 230,880 people reached



Opioid Use Disorder Resource Cards

Harm Reduction

- Developed to educate individuals on common signs of an overdose and how to administer Naloxone
- Available in English & Spanish
- Attached to every box of Naloxone given from our Public Health Vending Machines and given during trainings





Unresponsive or unconscious



Slowed or stopped breathing



Snoring or gurgling sounds



Cold or clammy skin



Discolored lips or fingernails







Call 911
Follow the operator's instructions. Give rescue breaths, if needed. Be

prepared to give CPR.



Give 1st Dose

Insert tip of Narcan nozzle in either nostril until your fingers touch the nose. Press the plunger firmly to release the dose of Narcan.



Watch & Give

If there is no response after 2-3 minutes, give a second dose. Stay with the person until help arrives.

Harm Reduction

- Identified areas in West Allis with high overdose rates and directly mailed postcards to residents
- Messaging brought awareness to the signs of an overdose and where individuals can access free Naloxone
- 1,350+ postcards mailed

TV Commercials

Prevention & Early Intervention

- Educated individuals on signs of an overdose and where they can access Naloxone in their community
- 30 second English & Spanish commercials created and aired over 750 times on CBS 58, WMLW, & Telemundo
- 3.3 million households reached






